### Scotland & Edinburgh



Scotland is a country with a great sense of history and a long tradition of learning and innovation. Over the years, Scots have led the way in many areas of philosophy, education, medicine, technology and science. The Scottish education system has an excellent reputation world-wide: thousands of overseas students come to study here every year.

Scotland attracts visitors from all over the world who come to experience its stunning landscapes, historic castles and bustling cities.

Edinburgh, the ancient and beautiful capital of Scotland, is a vibrant and cosmopolitan city. As a study and tourist destination, Edinburgh has few rivals. Since 1995, both the Old Town and the New Town have been classified as UNESCO World Heritage Sites, and in 2015 the Forth Bridge became Scotland's sixth World Heritage site. The city was voted The Guardian and The Observer's Favourite UK City for 13 consecutive years from 2000-2012, and in 2018 was voted Britain's Best City to Visit for a fifth year running in The Telegraph's Top 20 travel destinations.

Edinburgh's beautiful architecture, wide range of visitor attractions and excellent location make it the perfect destination to explore Scotland and access other parts of the UK. London can easily be reached from Edinburgh, only 1 hour by plane or 4.5 hours by train, yet Edinburgh offers everything a visitor to the UK could wish to experience. Edinburgh is steeped in academic history and also has the reputation of being one of Britain's safest cities, where a warm welcome is assured to visitors. Edinburgh is the political, legal and financial centre of Scotland, home to the Scottish Parliament Building and the annual Edinburgh International Festival, the largest arts festival in Europe.

# Edinburgh College

Edinburgh College is one of the largest publicly-funded further education colleges in the UK. Based in Scotland, UK, we welcome around 27,000 students every year to our four campuses in Edinburgh city: Sighthill, Granton, Milton Road and Midlothian.

## Section 2: Summer School Course Details

**Duration:** 3 weeks

**Course:** Intensive English, including inquiry-based learning Project Work and enhanced Social and Cultural Programme.

**Total class hours:** 20 hours per week

**Minimum Age:** 16 years

**English class sizes:** maximum 15 students

Edinburgh College has run English Language Summer School courses for adults for over 35 years. Students will join our General English classes in the morning (12 hours per week), Project Work (inquiry-based learning) classes (3 hours per week) and will study one of our Intensive English options on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons (5 hours per week). Intensive English options include: English for Business, English for Tourism, English and UK Culture, Presentation Skills, IELTS Preparation and Academic Writing for Higher Education\*.

Classes have a good mix of nationalities, with students coming from many different countries, including Europe (e.g. Spain, France, Italy, Poland, Switzerland, Germany); Latin America (e.g. Panama, Brazil); Asia (e.g. Japan, Taiwan, South Korea); and the Middle East (e.g. Saudi Arabia, Libya). While there are a high number of individual applicants to summer courses, the College also attracts groups. Recent groups studying on our International Summer School include students from Spain, Panama, Italy, Japan, Russia and China.

\*Intensive English modules are available subject to student demand.

## Course content

### General English (12 hours per week)

Suitable for students of all levels from Elementary to Advanced. The General English course focuses on improving all aspects of English communication skills including reading, writing, listening and speaking, as well as activating and extending knowledge of grammar and vocabulary. Activities will be based on real-life topics to motivate and engage students. Students will have the chance to express themselves in English and fix any errors made. We use a variety of interesting topics and students will also have the chance to improve their presentation skills and functional language.

Our lecturers utilise the communicative approach and focus on creating a learner-centred classroom. The aim of this is to strengthen learners' confidence in using English and develop their autonomy as learners, to support their ongoing language learning following the course. Throughout the course, sessions will be focused on developing English communication skills and will aim to improve the participants' confidence and ability in conversation and discussion. Sessions will be fully interactive using up-to-date communicative language teaching methodology and practical activities. Students will have opportunities to give feedback and input into class content and what areas they would like to focus on improving.

### Project Work (inquiry-based learning) (3 hours per week)

Three hours per week of class time will be dedicated to project work utilising inquiry-based learning. Project work will focus on real world problems, both local and global, and their solutions. The project will encourage students to ask questions to explore these issues and undertake their own research before organising and presenting their work to the class. We encourage students to choose topics for their projects that are personally of interest to them, and they will have the opportunity to go out and do research and interview other people. Current topics using inquiry-based learning are: Tourism, gap years, media, inventions and global business, but these can be adapted to each group.

Example project outlines:

#### Students will research the topic and prepare an article for a magazine on globalization

- Research the topic of globalization from both the stand-points of employment and culture
- Prepare an article outlining the features of globalization and its impact on society
- Write collaboratively and support the article with visuals
- Defend and discuss the points raised in their articles

#### Students will design a campaign to raise awareness of an issue of their choice

- Provide an aim for their project
- Explain what the project aims to change
- Describe the people the project is aimed at
- Suggest how to get media attention
- Design a poster advertising their project

### Intensive English (5 hours per week)

The Intensive English afternoon classes build on the General English course by giving students the opportunity to focus on particular areas of English they wish to develop. Example modules include English and UK Culture; English for Business; English for Computing; English for Tourism; Presentation Skills; or IELTS Preparation. Modules are subject to availability and will run according to student demand and student levels of English.

### Friday Fun: Team Challenges

Every Friday during Summer School all our students and teachers join together in The Atrium to compete in team challenges. This provides students an excellent opportunity to meet students from different classes and use their English language skills to complete team tasks against the clock. Our Team Challenges are designed to be a fun, supportive environment for students to apply their English language skills and integrate meta-skills further into our Summer School curriculum. During Friday Fun sessions, students are encouraged to practice and apply creative and critical thinking, cross-cultural communication, emotional intelligence and work collaboratively as part of team.

## What to expect

### In the classroom:

- build confidence using English in an immersive English-language environment.
- improve communication skills, functional language and pronunciation.
- improve competencies in the four skills of speaking, listening, reading and writing.
- activate and extend knowledge and use of English grammar, vocabulary and improve natural use of English.
- engage in a variety of tasks, materials and activities, including problem-solving, information exchanges, role-plays, discussions and practical tasks that relate to or simulate real-world English.
- project work using inquiry-based learning, looking at real world problems and solutions to encourage critical thinking and creativity.
- prioritise meaningful, communicative language over traditional exercises.
- learn with enthusiastic, experienced and friendly teachers who receive consistently excellent feedback.
- have opportunities to share opinions and contribute ideas.
- learn in small groups, with a partner and as a whole class.
- learn about Scottish, British and international cultures and get a taste of college life in the UK.

### Outside the classroom:

- **Homestay Accommodation** - Live like a local with one of our homestay hosts. They'll welcome you into their homes as though you are part of the family.
- **Enhanced Social Programme** - Experience the rich culture and beauty of Edinburgh and Scotland, exploring some of its historical and cultural highlights. Spend time socialising with your classmates outside the classroom.
- **Holistic Student Support** - Enjoy wraparound student support from our dedicated international team - here to help at every step of the journey!

## What's included in this programme:

- All tuition and course materials

- Provision for 1 Group Escort, including homestay accommodation, travel pass, weekday lunches in the College cafeteria, and participation in all Social Programme activities.

## Pre-Arrival:

Students will receive a detailed pre-arrival information pack to help them prepare for their course and stay in Edinburgh, as well as an online placement test to assess their current English language level. Pre-course tasks can be provided to support students to make the most of their time in Edinburgh.

## On Arrival:

An Edinburgh College staff member will meet and greet the students upon arrival at the airport and organise taxis to their homestay accommodation. The group will be given travel passes and important information about their first day in College.

## The first day:

Homestay hosts will help students to arrive at the College for 9:00am where they will meet the International Team, their teachers and classmates. They will have a full induction, including the opportunity to speak to a teacher to ensure they are placed in English classes with students who have a similar level of English.

## End of course:

All students will receive an Edinburgh College Certificate of Study at the end of their course. All students will be asked to complete feedback about their time at Edinburgh College.



## Section 3: Social Programme

The Social and Cultural Programme gives students the opportunity to visit places of historical and cultural importance in Edinburgh and Scotland and to gain a more in-depth understanding of Scottish culture. It also offers the chance to get to know classmates outside of the classroom and use English language skills in real-life settings.

The proposed Social Programme includes:

- City centre orientation (on the first Monday of their course)
- 3 x full-day excursions to popular tourist destinations in Scotland, for example Callander and Loch Katrine, St Andrews or Glasgow.
- 8 x afternoon or evening visits to popular Edinburgh tourist sites of interest such as Edinburgh Castle or Palace of Holyrood House, as well as social activities such as roller-skating and attending a ceilidh – an evening of Scottish music and dancing.

Example activities from previous groups include:

- Discover Scotland's past, present and future at the National Museum
- Relish the Royal grandeur of The Palace of Holyroodhouse or Falkland Palace & Gardens
- Connect with nature at Edinburgh's Royal Botanic Gardens, Loch Lomond or the Trossachs National Park
- Explore iconic Edinburgh Castle or experience the spectacular Edinburgh Military Tattoo performance
- Visit Glasgow or pretty seaside towns like St Andrews and Anstruther
- Enjoy an Edinburgh Fringe Festival show or an evening of dance and music at a traditional Scottish ceilidh

### Edinburgh, the Festival City

The summer is always a very exciting time in Edinburgh, and August is especially full of delights, with many festivals happening across the city, including the Edinburgh International Festival, Fringe Festival, Edinburgh Military Tattoo, International Book Festival, Jazz and Blues Festival. During the Festival period, we include visits to Festival events as part of the Social and Cultural Programme.

Information on places of interest, visitor attractions and entertainment will be provided so that students can also organise their own visits and activities during their free time.



## Section 4: Campus Facilities

### Classrooms

Classrooms are of a good size and fully equipped. All classrooms have Smartboards with internet connection.

### International Centre

The International Centre will provide support to the group in all non-academic areas with practicalities such as:

- visa letters
- induction to College life
- pastoral care
- pre-arrival information
- city orientation
- accommodation support
- airport transfers
- social programme activities
- drop-in student support

### The College Library

The College Library contains books and materials on a wide range of subjects including Computing, Business, Photography, Music and Tourism, as well as English language. Students on the Summer School can:

- borrow English language study books, graded readers, exam practice materials (Cambridge, IELTS etc)
- use audio equipment for listening practice and pronunciation work
- read newspapers and magazines; use the reference section (dictionaries, grammar references, encyclopaedias)
- use computers for internet access, work on group projects and to access additional online study resources
- use group and silent study spaces to focus on their studies or group projects

### Cafeteria

The cafeteria provides a range of hot and cold meals, tea, coffee, drinks and snacks.

### Social Spaces

The Atrium is a large social space for students to relax between classes. It is also used for graduations and Friday Fun Team Challenges on Fridays. Sighthill campus also has a Quiet Room, with comfortable seating for students to relax in, a Summer School Social Room stocked with games and activities for students to spend time with classmates during breaktimes and several outdoor spaces for students to enjoy fresh air and socialise during breaktimes.

## Section 5: Accommodation, Meals, Transport & Student Support

### Homestay Accommodation

Homestay accommodation is provided as part of this proposal. This gives students the opportunity to live as part of a local household, practise speaking English and learn more about Scottish and British life outside the classroom. All our homestay accommodation has been inspected and is in accordance with Accreditation UK criteria.

Our dedicated Accommodation Officer manages our network of homestay hosts in-house. Our hosts are very experienced and most have been providing a home-from-home for international students for many years.



Accommodation for students is usually in single rooms but shared (twin) rooms may be available upon request. Breakfast and evening meals are provided each day and hosts are sensitive to the dietary requirements and preferences of their guests. Students are required to complete our homestay preferences questionnaire pre-arrival, which is used to gather important information about any allergies, dietary requirements, preferences, etc. Our Accommodation Officer then places the students with the most suitable host, taking preferences into account. All of our homestay accommodation is located a short bus or tram ride from the college and some hosts are within walking distance.

## Food and Meals

**Breakfast and dinner** will be provided by the students' homestay hosts.

**Lunches (Monday – Friday)** will be provided in the College cafeteria. Students will be able to choose from a range of hot meals, sandwiches, soups, salads and snacks, as well as hot and cold drinks.

**Lunches (Saturday and Sunday)** are not included in this proposal.

## Airport Transfers

An Edinburgh College staff member will meet and greet the students upon arrival at Glasgow airport and will arrange transfers by coach and taxi to their homestay accommodation in Edinburgh. Students will receive an Arrival Pack, with information about Edinburgh, maps, their travel pass, and instructions for Day 1 of the course.

On departure, taxis and a coach will be organised to take students from their homestay accommodation to Glasgow airport.

## Public Transportation in Edinburgh

Edinburgh has very good public transport – buses and trams are very frequent and go to all parts of the city. Depending on the location of their homestay accommodation, students may need to get a bus or tram to College.

Students will be provided a Ridacard, which allows them to travel for free on Lothian buses and trams in the city throughout their stay.



Sighthill Campus is located between the airport and the city centre. It takes approximately 20-30 minutes by bus or tram from Sighthill campus to the city centre.

## Student Support

The International Team provide support to the group in all non-academic areas such as pre-arrival information, airport transfers, travel passes, city orientation, induction, pastoral care and social programme activities. The international team are based at Sighthill campus so there is always someone available to support with any questions or issues on campus.

## Welfare Support

Our dedicated Team Leader for International Projects and Student Support, as well as our International Project Assistants will manage all non-academic aspects of the programme, and will be available to answer any questions or concerns that students may have throughout their stay. A 24-hour emergency phone number will be provided.
